CAUTION

Devices such as CMOS, NMOS, VMOS, HMOS, thin-film resistors PMOS, and MOSFET used in many equipments can be damaged by static voltages present in most repair facilities. - STEP 3. Ground the repair operator using a conductive wrist strap or other device using a 1 M series resistor to protect the operator.
- STEP 4. Ground any tools (including soldering equipment) that will contact the unit. Contact with the operator's hand provides a sufficient ground for tools that are otherwise electrically isolated.
- STEP 5. All electrostatic sensitive replacement components are shipped in conductive foam or tubes and must be stored in the original shipping container until installed.
- STEP 6. When these devices and assemblies are removed from the unit, they should be placed on the conductive work surface or in conductive containers.
- STEP 7. When not being worked on, wrap disconnected circuit boards in aluminum foil or in plastic bags that have been coated or impregnated with a conductive material.
- STEP 8. Do not handle these devices unnecessarily or remove them from their packages until actually used or tested.

CHAPTER 1 INTRODUCTION

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Section I. GENERAL INFORMATION

1-1. SCOPE.

This manual describes the Transmission Test Set, AN/USM-608 (test set), and gives instructions for unit maintenance and intermediate direct and general support maintenance. The test set (fig. 1-1) is a combined Transmission Impairment Measurement Set (TIMS) and Return Loss (RL) tester designed to test telecommunications networks.

1-2. CONSOLIDATED ARMY PUBLICATIONS AND FORMS INDEX.

Refer to the latest issue of DA Pam 25-30 to determine whether there are new editions, changes, or additional publications pertaining to the equipment.

1-3. MAINTENANCE FORMS AND RECORDS.

Section II. EQUIPMENT DESCRIPTION AND DATA

1-9 EQUIPMENT CHARACTERISTICS, CAPABILITIES AND FEATURES

Equipment characteristics, capabilities and features are described in TM 11-6625-3187-10.

1-10 LOCATION AND DESCRIPTION OF MAJOR COMPONENTS

The major components of the test set are shown in figure 1-1.

- KEYBOARD Used to the enter commands that control the test set.
- MAIN CHASSIS Contains computer, memory and test set electronics.
- 310 PATCH CORD Used to connect RCV and XMT jacks together during self test.
- FUSE Spare 4 ampere, slow-blow fuse.
- POWER CORD Used to connect the test set to the AC power source.
- ADAPTER Used to adapt a 310 phone plug to a dual banana plug.

1-11 EQUIPMENT DATA

Equipment data for the test set are provided in TM 11-6625-3187-10.

1-12 SAFETY, CARE AND HANDLING

Observe all WARNINGS, CAUTIONS, and NOTES in this manual. This equipment can be extremely dangerous if these instructions are not followed.

Section III. PRINCIPLES OF OPERATION

1-13 GENERAL FUNCTIONAL DESCRIPTION

The general functional description of the test set is provided in TM 11-6625-3187-10.

1-14 DETAILED FUNCTIONAL DESCRIPTION

- a. *Test Set Hardware*. A detailed functional diagram of the test set is shown in figure FO-1. Locate the major assemblies in the test set using the number keys in the following description.
- (1) FARADAY BOARD Functions as the central processing unit (CPU) that controls the overall operation of the test set. It contains the following main elements:
 - <u>Microprocessor</u> Performs arithmetic, data transfer, logical, character string manipulation, control transfer and processor control functions. It performs these functions by executing a series of instructions which, together, form a program. The microprocessor gets these instructions from memory (see below).
 - <u>Clock</u> Produces timing signals which control the speed at which the microprocessor operates.
 - <u>Random Access Memory (RAM)</u> The microprocessor uses RAM as temporary storage space for data. The data contained in RAM disappears when power is removed from the test set.
 - <u>Erasable Programmable Read-Only Memory (EPROM)</u> Contains a permanent set of software instructions that remains even if power is removed from the test set. Together, these instructions form a program known as the built-in operating system (BIOS).

- <u>Input/output W/Q) Ports</u> Circuits which process keyboard inputs and control the speaker output under control of the microprocessor.
- <u>Disk Controller</u> Controls the operation of the 360 kB disk drive and the data flow between the drive and the microprocessor.
- <u>Timer</u> Programmed by the microprocessor to produce signals at various frequencies. In the test set, the timer is used to produce an audio signal for the speaker.
- <u>Speaker Logic</u> Gates the timer signal to the speaker by way of the TIMS interface board. The interface board may interrupt this signal and route its own signal to the speaker.
- <u>Direct Memory Access (DMA) Controller</u> Allows direct transfers of data between memory (RAM) and other devices (such as disk drives or the DSP board) without routing the data through the microprocessor, which is normally done. This allows the microprocessor to perform other tasks while large amounts of data are being transferred. The DMA controller operates according to instructions provided by the microprocessor before the data transfer takes place.
- Interrupt Controller The execution of a program by the microprocessor can be temporarily halted using a software interrupt instruction or a hardware interrupt signal. An interrupt causes the microprocessor to save where it is in the program and then branch to another small program. After that small program is finished, the microprocessor goes back to where it was in the original program and continues execution. The interrupt controller allows several devices (such as disk drives, graphics controller, keyboard, etc.) to interrupt the microprocessor, one at a time, to take care of their immediate needs. The interrupt controller is programmed by the microprocessor to determine the priority of interrupts and to enable or disable interrupts, as required.
- <u>Buffers</u> Provide the signal strength necessary to drive the circuits to which they are attached. Most buffers can be turned on, turned off, or set to a high-impedance state. These are called tri-state buffers and are controlled by signals derived from the microprocessor.
- <u>Internal Data/Address/Control Bus</u> Consists of 20 combined data/address signals and a number of individual control signals. The data signals are bi-directional (data can be transferred in both directions). The addresses are one-way signals from the microprocessor. Control signals are oneway signals to or from the microprocessor.
- <u>Bus Controller</u> Programmed by the microprocessor to convert microprocessor data into signals which are used to control the memory and other circuits connected to the external data bus.
- <u>External Data/Address/Control Bus</u> Similar to the internal bus. It contains eight bi-directional data lines, 20 unidirectional address lines, control signals from the bus controller, and interrupt request signals from the various devices connected to the bus. The external data/address/control bus is connected to all other circuits on the Faraday board as well as all other circuit boards. This allows the microprocessor to control the operation of the entire test set.
- (2) MOTHER BOARD Allows various circuit boards to be connected to the external data/address/control bus. In addition, it contains an analog signal bus which interconnects the DSP board and the interface board.
- (3) IEEE-488 CONTROLLER Converts microprocessor data into IEEE-488 data and control output signals and it converts IEEE-488 data and control input signals into data for the microprocessor. The CPU interface circuits decode or encode microprocessor commands while the GPIB interface controller decodes or encodes IEEE488 data and commands.

- (4) MB FIXED DISK DRIVE SYSTEM Consists of a fixed disk drive controller and a 10 MB fixed disk drive. The fixed disk controller automatically controls the operation of the fixed disk drive. When data are to be stored, the microprocessor notifies the controller and then transfers the data to the controller. The controller then writes the data to the disk drive. When data are to be retrieved, the microprocessor requests the data from the controller. The controller reads the data from the disk drive and sends the data to the microprocessor. The 10 MB fixed disk drive contains the disk operating system (DOS), a complete set of DOS utility programs, and TIMS/RL test software.
- (5) CONTROLLER BOARD Converts data from the microprocessor into video signals. These signals cause the cathode ray tube (CRT) display monitor to display characters or graphics that represent the data. The board contains a memory which stores character and graphics data provided by the microprocessor. The data in this memory is what is displayed on the CRT. The video output signals are supplied to both the CRT display monitor and a video output connector. The graphics controller board also contains a parallel printer driver interface circuit which is functionally separate from the graphics controller circuits.
- (6) DISPLAY MONITOR Consists of a high voltage circuit card and a CRT. The assembly receives a video signal, a horizontal sync signal (H) and a vertical sync signal (V) from the graphics controller and displays them on the CRT like a television.
- (7) (DIGITAL SIGNAL PROCESSING) BOARD A dedicated microprocessor-controlled system. The DSP board converts command and value data received from the microprocessor into the actions necessary to control TIMS/RL testing functions. The result data collected during TIMS/RL testing is manipulated and sent back to the microprocessor on the Faraday board. The DSP board contains two microprocessors, one operating as the master processor and one operating as a slave processor. The master processor interfaces with the microprocessor in the Faraday board and controls the TIMS/RL received signal measurement functions. The slave processor controls the TIMS/RL transmitter functions. Each processor has its own memory. The programs necessary for operation of both processors are downloaded into memory by the TC system software during power up just before the main menu is displaved.

Received signals from the interface board are applied to an analog-to-digital converter (ADC). The ADC produces coded digital data that represent the characteristics of the received signal. These digital data are applied to opto-isolators. The isolators are used to change digital signal voltage levels. They convert digital input signals into light signals which are then converted back into digital signals. The digital data from the isolators are applied to the master processor. The master processor measures the characteristics of the received signal by analyzing the digital data representing the signal.

The slave microprocessor produces digital data representing the characteristics of the analog signal to be transmitted. These data are applied through opto-isolators to a digital-to-analog converter (DAC). The DAC converts the digital transmit data into analog transmit signals, which are then routed to the interface board.

- (8) INTERFACE BOARD Contains relays and various source and load impedance circuits that are controlled by a control logic circuit. The control logic receives data from the microprocessor in the Faraday board and converts these data into signals that control two-wire/four-wire termination, tip/ring, connector switching, impedance selection and talk battery relays. Additional signals from the control logic select the signal to be applied to the speaker.
- (9) ASSEMBLY Converts keystrokes into serial digital data which are applied to the I/O ports in the Faraday board. These I/O ports convert the serial data into parallel data and send the data to the microprocessor. The timing signals necessary for operation of the keyboard is provided by Faraday board.

b. Test Set Software. When power is first turned on, the BIOS (located in the PROM on the Faraday board) performs a power-on self test (POST), which checks the main circuits on the Faraday board as well as the

fixed disk system, the graphics controller and the 360 kB disk drive. If POST Is successful, the operator is notified with a single long beep using the speaker. If a problem is found during POST, the operator is notified, if possible, using an error message on the CRT display monitor.

If the POST is successful, then the BIOS looks for the disk operating system (DOS). First, the 360 kB disk drive Is checked. If there is no disk in the drive, it then checks the 10 MB fixed disk. If DOS cannot be found, the test set stops operation and displays a message. The DOS program must be on one of these disks or the test set cannot be operated. Normally, DOS is present on the fixed disk drive and the 360 kB disk drive is disabled with a door lock device. When DOS is found, BIOS loads DOS into RAM. After that, the BIOS transfers control of the test set to DOS.



The DOS program manages the overall operation of the test set and automatically loads and executes the telecommunications (TC) system software located on the fixed disk drive. As soon as the TC system software is loaded, it takes control of the test set and loads a set of specialized programs into the DSP board master and slave processor memories. These specialized programs then control the operation of the DSP board. The TC system software controls the test set during normal operation until the test set is turned off again. The TC system software consists



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of a set of programs that display messages, accept operator keyboard inputs, interface with the programs in the DSP board, controls the TIMS interface board and communicates with the IEEE-488 interface controller. Thus, the operator never has occasion to interface directly with DOS. During maintenance of the test set, it may become necessary for the technician to interface with DOS.

When disk data needs to be read or written from disk, the TC system software programs use software service routines that are a part of DOS. These routines determine how the data on the disk drives are organized and where to read or write the data. The DOS service routines, in turn, use hardware access routines that are contained in the BIOS. These are the routines that actually communicate with the disk controllers. After initialization, the TC system software controls the DSP board, the TIMS interface board, the IEEE-488 interface controller and the graphics controller directly, without using DOS or BIOS routines.

CHAPTER 2 UNIT MAINTENANCE PROCEDURES

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Section I. REPAIR PARTS; SPECIAL TOOLS; TEST, MEASUREMENT, AND DIAGNOSTIC EQUIPMENT (TMDE); AND SUPPORT EQUIPMENT

2-1. COMMON TOOLS AND EQUIPMENT.

Common tools and equipment required for unit maintenance of the test set are listed in the Maintenance Allocation Chart (MAC). See Appendix B.

2-2. SPECIAL TOOLS, TMDE, AND SUPPORT EQUIPMENT.

No special tools or support equipment are required.

2-3. REPAIR PARTS.

Repair parts are listed and illustrated in the Repair Parts and Special Tools List, TM 11-6625-3187-24P.

Section II. SERVICE UPON RECEIPT

2-4. UNPACKING.

The test set is shipped assembled in its original packing container. Unpack carefully and do not damage the container while unpacking. Save the container for use in reshipment.

2-5. CHECKING UNPACKED EQUIPMENT

a. Inspect for damage incurred during shipment. If the equipment has been damaged, report the damage on SF 364, Report of Discrepancy (ROD) for use.

b. Check the equipment against the packing slip to see if the shipment is complete. Report all discrepancies in accordance with the instructions of DA PAM 750-8.

c. Check to see whether the equipment has been modified.

Make sure that the AC voltage setting on the back of the test set matches the AC source voltage to be used. If this is not done, the test will be damaged.

CHECKING AC VOLTAGE SETTING

At the rear of the test set, observe the four holes in the fuse panel. The hole with the pin in it identifies the AC voltage Input setting. Verify that the setting is correct. If it is not, change the AC voltage setting.



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CHANGING AC VOLTAGE SETTING

- 1. At the rear of the test set, remove the fuse panel (4) by Inserting a small flat-blade screwdriver into the slot (1) and carefully prying the panel out.
- 2. Using a pair of needle-nose pliers, remove the AC voltage programming circuit card (6).
- 3. Position the programming pin (2) on the AC voltage programming circuit card to select the required AC input voltage.
- 4. Re-install the AC voltage programming circuit card in its receptacle with the pin facing out.

INSTALLING CORRECT FUSE

 If the selected AC input voltage Is 100 or 120 VAC, make sure that the fuse (5) in the fuse panel (4) is a 4 Ampere, SLO-BLO. If the AC input voltage is 220 or 240 VAC, make sure that the fuse is a 2 Ampere, SLO-BLO.

DESK TOP INSTALLATION

- 1. Place test set on a surface measuring at least 20 inches wide by 30 inches deep.
- 2. Unlatch keyboard. Lift front of test set slightly and lower keyboard. The front of the test set will rest on the rear of the keyboard.

RACK INSTALLATION

- 1. Prepare rack to accept test set using the following test set dimensions as a guide. Make sure to leave enough room to lower the keyboard without impacting other equipment.

Programs contained on an alignment disk are used to automatically adjust the transmit and receive circuits in the DSP board. To do this, the program causes the DSP board to produce an output voltage and asks the technician to measure the voltage. The technician is then Instructed to enter the measured voltage value. After that, the program compares the voltage that the DSP produced and the voltage that the DSP measured against the actual output voltage measured by the technician. Any difference voltages are used to correct an Internal adjustment table of voltage programming correction and measurement correction values. When this is done, the technician is instructed to turn off the write protect switch on the DSP board, allowing the board to receive and store data. After the technician has accomplished this, the program downloads the new adjustment tables Into the DSP board memory. During normal operation, these new adjustment tables are used to correct transmitted voltages and received signal measurements. This alignment procedure is done separately for voice band and wide band levels.

APPENDIX B MAINTENANCE ALLOCATION CHART (MAC)

SECTION I. INTRODUCTION

B-1. GENERAL.

a. This introduction provides a general explanation of all maintenance and repair function authorized at the two maintenance levels under the Two-Level Maintenance System concept.

b. The MAC in Section II designates overall authority and responsibility for the performance of maintenance functions on the identified end-item or component. The application of the maintenance functions to the end-item or component shall be consistent with the capabilities of the designated maintenance levels, which are shown on the MAC in Column (4) as:

- 1. Field includes two sub-columns, Unit (C (operator/crew) and O (unit) maintenance) and Direct Support (F) maintenance.
- 2. Sustainment includes two sub-columns, general support (H) and depot (D).

c. The tools and test equipment requirements in Section III list the tools and test equipment (both special tools and common tool sets) required for each maintenance function as referenced from the MAC.

d. The remarks in Section IV contain supplemental instructions and explanatory notes for a particular maintenance function.

B-2. MAINTENANCE FUNCTIONS.

Maintenance functions are limited to and defined as follows:

a. Inspect. To determine the serviceability of an item by comparing its physical, mechanical, and/or electrical characteristics with established standards through examination (e.g. by sight, sound, or feel). This includes scheduled inspection and gagings and evaluation of cannon tubes.

b. Test. To verify serviceability by measuring the mechanical, pneumatic, hydraulic, or electrical characteristics of an item and comparing those characteristics with prescribed standards on a scheduled basis, i.e., load testing of lift devices and hydrostatic testing of pressure hoses.

c. Service. Operations required periodically to keep an item in proper operating condition; e.g., to clean (includes decontaminate, when required), to preserve, to drain, to paint, or to replenish fuel, lubricants, chemical fluids, or gases. This includes scheduled exercising and purging of recoil mechanisms. The following are examples of service functions:

d. Adjust. To maintain or regulate, within prescribed limits, by bringing into proper position, or by setting the operating characteristics to specified parameters.

e. Align. To adjust specified variable elements of an item to bring about optimum or desired performance.

f. Calibrate. To determine and cause corrections to be made or to be adjusted on instruments of test, measuring, and diagnostic equipment used in precision measurement. Consists of comparisons of two instruments, one of which is a certified standard of known accuracy, to detect and adjust any discrepancy in the accuracy of the instrument being compared.

g. Remove/Install. To remove and install the same item when required to perform service or other maintenance functions. Install may be the act of emplacing, seating, or fixing into position a spare, repair part, or module (component or assembly) in a manner to allow the proper functioning of an equipment or system.

h. Replace. To remove an unserviceable item and install a serviceable counterpart in its place "Replace" is authorized by the MAC and assigned maintenance level is shown as the third position code of the Source, Maintenance and Recoverability (SMR) code.

i. Repair. The application of maintenance services, including fault location/troubleshooting, removal/installation, disassembly/assembly procedures and maintenance actions to identify troubles and restore serviceability to an item by correcting specific damage, fault, malfunction, or failure in a part, subassembly, module (component or assembly), end-item or system.

<u>NOTE</u>

The following definitions are applicable to the "repair" maintenance function:

- 1. <u>Services</u>. Inspect, test, service adjust, align, calibrate, and/or replace.
- 2. <u>Fault location/troubleshooting</u>. The process of investigating and detecting the case of equipment malfunctioning; the act of isolating a fault within a system or Unit Under Test (UUT).
- <u>Disassembly/assembly</u>. The step-by-step breakdown (taking apart) of a spare/functional group coded item to the level of its least component, that is assigned an SMR code for the level of maintenance under consideration (i.e., identified as maintenance significant).
- 4. Actions. Welding, grinding, riveting, straightening, facing, machining, and/or resurfacing.

j. Overhaul. That maintenance effort (service/action) prescribed to restore an item to a completely serviceable/operational condition as required by maintenance standards in appropriate technical publications. Overhaul is normally the highest degree of maintenance performed by the Army. Overhaul does not normally return an item to like new condition.

k. Rebuild. Consists of those services/actions necessary for the restoration of unserviceable equipment to a like new condition in accordance with original manufacturing standards. Rebuild is the highest degree of material maintenance applied to Army equipment. The rebuild operation includes the act of returning to zero those age measurements (e.g., hours/miles) considered in classifying Army equipment/components.

B-3. EXPLANTION OF COLUMNS IN THE MAC, SECTION II.

a. Column (1) Group Number. Column (1) lists Functional Group Code (FGC) numbers, the purpose of which is to identify maintenance significant components, assemblies, subassemblies, and modules with the Next Higher Assembly (NHA).

b. Column (2) Component/Assembly. Column (2) contains the item names of components, assemblies, subassemblies, and modules for which maintenance is authorized.

c. Column (3) Maintenance Function. Column (3) lists the functions to be performed on the item listed in Column (2). (For a detailed explanation of these functions, refer to "Maintenance Functions" outlined above.)

d. Column (4) Maintenance Level. Column (4) specifies each level of maintenance authorized to perform each function listed in Column (3), by indicating work-time required (expressed as man-hours in whole hours or decimals) in the appropriate sub-column. The work-time figure represents the active time required to perform that maintenance function at the indicated level of maintenance. If the number or
complexity of the tasks within the listed maintenance function varies at different maintenance levels, appropriate work-time figures are to be shown for each level. The work-time figure represents the average time required to restore an item (assembly, subassembly, component, module, end-item or system) to a serviceable condition under typical field operating conditions. This time includes preparation time (including any necessary disassembly/assembly time), troubleshooting/fault location time, and quality assurance time in addition to the time required to perform the specific tasks identified for the maintenance functions authorized in the MAC. The symbol designations for the various maintenance levels are as follows:

- 1. Field:
- C Operator or Crew maintenance
- O Unit maintenance
- F Direct Support maintenance
- 2. <u>Sustainment</u>:
 - H General Support maintenance
 - D Depot maintenance

<u>NOTE</u>

The "L" maintenance level is not included in Column (4) of the MAC. Functions to this level of maintenance are identified by a work-time figure in the "H" column of Column (4), and an associated reference code is used in the REMARKS Column (6). This code is keyed to the remarks, and the SRA complete repair application is explained there.

e. Column (5) Tools and Equipment Reference Code. Column (5) specifies, by code, those common tool sets (not individual tools), common Test, Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment (TMDE), and special tools, special TMDE and special support equipment required to perform the designated function. Codes are keyed to the entries in the tools and test equipment table.

f. Column (6) Remarks Code. When applicable, this column contains a letter code, in alphabetical order, which is keyed to the remarks table entries.

B-4. EXPLANATION OF COLUMNS IN TOOLS AND TEST EQUIPMENT REQUIREMENTS, SECTION III.

a. Column (1) Tool or Test Equipment Reference Code. The tool or test equipment reference code correlates with a code used in Column (5) of the MAC.

b. Column (2) Maintenance Level. The lowest level of maintenance authorized to use the tool or test equipment.

- c. Column (3) Nomenclature. Name or identification of the tool or test equipment.
- d. Column (4) National Stock Number (NSN). The NSN of the tool or test equipment.
- e. Column (5) Tool Number. The manufacturer's part number, model number, or type number.

B-5. EXPLANATION OF COLUMNS IN THE REMARKS, SECTION IV.

a. Column (1) Remarks Code. The code recorded in Column (6) of the MAC.

b. Column (2) Remarks. This column lists information pertinent to the maintenance function being performed as indicated in the MAC.

b. Column (2) - Level. This column identifies the lowest level of maintenance that requires the listed item. Enter as applicable:

- C Operator/Crew
- O Organizational Maintenance
- F Intermediate Direct Support Maintenance
- H Intermediate General Support Maintenance
- D Depot Maintenance (Contractor)

c. Column (3) - National Stock Number. This is the National stock number assigned to the item; use it to request or requisition the item.

d. Column (4) - Description. Indicates the Federal item name and, if required, a description to identify the item. The last line for each item indicates the Commercial and Government Entity Code (CAGEC) (in parentheses) followed by the part number.

e. Column (5) - Unit of Measure (U/M). Indicates the measure used in performing the actual maintenance function. This measure is expressed by a two-character alphabetical abbreviation (e.g., ea, in, pr). If the unit of measure differs from the unit of issue, requisition the lowest unit of issue that will satisfy your requirements.

APPENDIX D IEEE-488 INTERFACE DESCRIPTION AND PROGRAMMING

D-1. INTRODUCTION

When the test set is connected to an IEEE-488 interface bus, it can be operated by a remote controller as part of a larger system. This appendix defines:

- The interface function capability of the test set as part of the IEEE-488 Interface bus.
- Each command accepted by the test set and each corresponding response produced by the test set.

The information in this appendix is not required for operation or maintenance of the test set. It is intended for use by programmers for the purpose of integrating the test set into a system automated by means of the IEEE-488 bus. The programmer should be familiar with the IEEE-488/ANSI MC1.1 standards before using the information in this appendix.

D-2. INTERFACE FUNCTION CAPABILITIES

The test set has the following IEEE-488 standard interface function capabilities:

Identification	Description
SH1	Source Handshake Interface Function. The test set can transfer multi4ine messages.
AH1	Acceptor Handshake Interface function. The test set can receive multi-line messages from the controller.
T6	Basic Talker. The test set is capable of transmitting data over the interface bus when addressed.
L4	Basic Listener. The test set is capable of receiving data over the interface when addressed.
SR1	Service Request Interface Function. The test set can asynchronously request service from the system controller.
RL1	Remote/Local Interface Function. The test set can operate in the local mode (commands entered from the keyboard) and in the remote mode (commands received from the system controller).
PP1	Parallel Poll Interface Function. The test set can uniquely identify itself if it requires service and the controller is requesting a response during a parallel poll.
DC1	Device Clear Interface Function. The test set will reset the TIMS/RL tester hardware if it receives a Device Clear command.

D-3. INTERFACE CONSIDERATIONS

a. Talker/Listener Modes. When addressed to talk, the test set will send data over the bus. If the test set has been addressed to talk, a data transfer sequence must take place before it is addressed again. A data

transfer sequence consists of a command to the test set and a response from the test set and ends with an EOI bus command. If the test set command has no response, the EOI bus command ends the sequence. When addressed to listen, the test set will process data received as commands.

If a talk or listen address, a device clear command or an unknown command is received by the test set while it is currently processing a command, a data accepted holdoff occurs. The holdoff period Is approximately 10 seconds; the program in the system controller must allow at least 10 seconds before sending further commands on the bus.

b. Polling. After a serial poll, the test set will respond with a status byte. The status byte is defined as follows:

c. Parallel Poll. The test set is defaulted to respond to a parallel poll on the DIO0 and DIO1 data lines using a positive sense. The test set may be configured remotely to respond to a parallel poll on any DIO data line. This is done using the parallel poll configure bus command.

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The status returned by the test set in response to a parallel poll will be the status of the SRQ bus line. If the test set is generating an SRQ, the parallel poll line will be set. If there is no SRQ, then the parallel poll status line will be clear.

d. Local Lockout. If the local lockout command is received, the test set keyboard will be disabled. The test set will unlock the keyboard when it receives the GTL bus command or if the REN message on the bus is de-asserted.

e. Device Clear. The test set will reset the TIMS/RL tester upon receipt of a device clear bus command.

D-4. IEEE-488 COMMANDS AND RESPONSES

a. Definition of Symbols. The symbols used during the descriptions of commands and responses have the following meanings:

<v></v>	a value entered by the programmer
[V]	a value or character that may be provided by the test set

b. General Command Format. Commands are sent to the test set as mnemonics consisting of three ASCII characters. If there is a parameter associated with the command, a space character must separate the parameter from the command mnemonic. A semicolon (;) must terminate a command. The general form of a command is:

AAA < parameter >;

where AAA is a three-character mnemonic.

c. General Test Result Format. The test set sends test results in groups, each consisting of one or more result strings. Each result string consists of a prefix, a space, numeric data representing a value, another space, a suffix and a line feed character. The last character of the last result string is transmitted with an EOI bus command. The general form of a result string is:

P [p][value] SSS LF

where:

P is the prefix, which identifies the value, p is the polarity of the value (- if negative, space if positive), SSS is the suffix, which identifies the unit of measure if any, and LF is the line feed character (OA, hexadecimal).
